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New Tutorials - Image Presentation – When we think about the presentation of digital images we can break it into two categories. Those we wish to present in the form of a print and those we wish to display electronically.

In fact the creative presentation techniques we need to use for print and/or electronic images is exactly the same for both of them. The only difference is the resolution we are working with.



We are quite used to framing images for our homes, but we can still ensure we present our images as well as we possible can, even when they are destined to be viewed from a screen or via a digital projector. ([Block mount technique above](#))

For many years we have created the frames for our prints digitally. The advantages are that we can choose the colour, the texture and technique to show off the image at its best. With some of these techniques, the effect is so authentic that people at our demo's run their fingers over the matt or block mount border to feel the indentation. Of course, it's not really there, just a digital effect, but out of all the digital effects we see, this is one of the better ones.

Presentation is a balancing act though, because the last thing we want to do is create a border or frame that is more interesting than the image it's supposed to be supporting. One of the more agreeable techniques is a mount created in harmony with your image. Use similar tones that the image displays and in most cases the frame does a great supporting job

Image Size – I find myself disappointed yet again that the photographic establishment seem determined to hold image size down. Why would we want to see a postage size image when there is no need?

The Photographic Society of Queensland Salon of Excellence 2015 states that maximum image size must be 1360*768 and I am sure there are many other examples of this. Why? There doesn't seem a great deal of logic to this size and I would expect The Photographic Society of Queensland (PSQ) to be the trend setters here.

For our UK readers, PSQ is affiliated to The Australian Photographic Society. The equivalent of The East Anglian Federation which is a part of the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain. So, why 1360 pixels * 768 pixels, which is more or less 16:9 aspect ratio (AR). Most screens that are 16:9 AR, will be 1366*768. A 5 to 6 pixel difference is hardly going make any difference at all so lets not get hung up on that small detail. Except to say that if you select 16:9 AR in Photoshop or Lightroom and then resize it down, it will come out to 1360*765.

Given that the images from many cameras will be 3:2 AR, or maybe some 4:3. Why isn't a maximum size set at 3000 pixels by 2000 pixels. 3:2 AR?

I can offer some reasons for this suggestion:-

1. An image that is sized down to a maximum of 3000*2000 pixels, even one containing lots of fine detail, can be saved as a Jpeg at level 6 at about 1MB. However, in most cases (less fine detail) the file size will be half or even a third of that 1MB. A JPG save quality of level 6 as a one off save for a competition isn't an issue at all. So, there can be no argument on the basis of keeping image size down even when we submit images digitally over the internet.

2. Judges who are judging our images remotely will have an image to view that will fill most of their large flat screens. 1920*1080 or 1920*1200 is a common screen size for photographic enthusiasts and the judges I come into contact with seem to be using these large flat screen monitors. This is how a 1360*768 image looks like on a 1920*1080 pixel monitor.



Remember, the judge cannot enlarge your 1360*768 image to fill their screen, without affecting the quality of it. Not a good thing to do when you have been asked to make a judgement on that image.

3. A 3:2 AR image at 3000*2000 pixels will not only fill the screen, but the judge has the opportunity to zoom the image a little. This ability to zoom in may make the difference between the judge having to guess at some aspect of the content. Easier to zoom in a little and confirm what they see. Better for all I would suggest.

4. A 3:2 AR image at 3000*2000 will display perfectly OK via a laptop and a projector whatever their resolutions are. There seems to be a view that if the projector is 1360*768, then all images must be that size. Wrong! If that was the case how would I be able to demonstrate a high resolution image at 6000 pixels, via a laptop running 1366*768 linked to a projector running 1024*768, but I do and have done for years.

I show HD slide shows (1920*1080) through various resolution projectors and there really isn't any issues. A few minutes spent trying this could be worthwhile for those who set the rules of competitions and therefore influence many photographers. I suspect rules are copied from the previous year and that is why we get into a rut.

Photoshop does come with a number of installed textures for use on images or frames and borders. However, if we get tired of those we can find quite a number of free textures via the internet. Just take the usual care when downloading anything from the net.



Textures generally need to be applied sparingly and in a delicate way in the majority of

cases. Here we have added a leather texture a little heavier than normal so you can see it clearly in our small image. Download the video from the link above and broaden your horizons

[PicturesToExe New Slide Show - Contrast](#) - I was a little disappointed in our visit to Cumbria UK in late 2014. We only had a short time there and we hoped that the light and the weather would give us the chance to capture some dramatic images.



Well, it doesn't always pan out like that and we have to do the best we can, especially in my case as that visit is likely to be my last. I worked through some of the images and was looking for something different in the way of music for a slide show on the Lake District.

I wanted to avoid anything I have used before and of course I want to avoid the obvious choices like Vivaldi's Four Seasons. As nice as that music is, every second show of the Lakes uses it, so there is as good a reason as you will find not to!! The music also has to in keeping with the style of images, but we want inspiring music too. I can find lots of dramatic music that is very inspirational, but not really suited to the images I managed to shoot in our UK visit last year.

The part finished sequence sat around for weeks waiting for some inspiration, but it came from an odd angle. I started to wonder if I could mix images from my old home in the UK with those from my new one Australia?



The resulting sequence **Contrast** contains about 60 images, 4 pieces of music and a couple of sound effects. I think it is a little different, but we are not always the best judges of our own work are we?

The sound editing was all able to be done within PicturesToExe. It really is a very convenient way to create slide shows when you can adjust the sound and view and listen to what you have done, right there in the Time Line. [Free Trial of PicturesToExe Slide Show Software Here](#)

This is one of those things that looks pretty simple when viewed on screen in a slide show, but it does take a little thought to achieve.

There are a few different ways we can approach this and I understand that there is also software available that will create an Mp4 video of a route being drawn on a map.

Here we believe we have the simplest way using any version of Photoshop or Elements and the eraser tool.

The main work is done in PicturesToExe and it will require some animation to achieve. Animating a line that moves solely in one direction is easy. The difficulty arises if your route travels South, then East and then South again as ours does.

Here we used animation to achieve the results you will see in our demo below. In our demo we have woven a couple of sound effects, a little commentary and music to create a pleasing result.

Audio Visual can be many things to many people, but a lot of photographers use it as a vehicle to display the many images they create. We visit places of interest and shoot lots of images, but what do we do with them?

If you are a Camera Club member, you may be searching for that elusive competition winner, but you will have lots of others that are still worth viewing.



Here we have a collection of images shot in just a couple of hours at Newark Air Museum in the

UK. Once we have taken the images we need to find a way to display them in such a way that the Audio Visual sequence becomes a photographic free standing project as a whole.



We are looking to present the pictures not as a simple batch of images, but something a little better than that. (if we can) Music is crucial to the mood we are trying to create and often difficult to find. Then we still have to manipulate the images in a way we feel is fitting to the music and the presentation as a whole.

Have we been successful? It's always difficult to tell, because we get so wrapped up in our own project and spend so much time on it, our judgement sometimes becomes a little blurred.
