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**Welcome to our September Newsletter** – I draw your attention to the image below because I posted this on the [Beckham Digital forum](#) in regard to natural history rules.

You can see from the original that I just managed to capture one image from 90 that I shot to capture the bird in flight. The original image was given to an official judge who said quite rightly how distracting the barbed wire was, in particular to where the barbs are in relation to the bird.

Manipulating this image to remove the wire instantly bans this image from a natural history competition, but why? What is it about removing the wire to improve this picture that so badly affects the credibility of the animal shown. Should we be judging the picture and not the degree of difficulty in capturing the picture, or dare I say luck in capturing the picture.



If I had sat there for a week and managed to capture a shot without the wire, I would be applauded as a real nature photographer, but where is the merit in that. I can't think of many other things in life where we would deliberately make life more difficult for ourselves. I especially say this with the thought in mind that a black and white conversion is allowable and so is HDR. A technique that in most of the cases would affect the credibility of the bird far more than removing the wire.

Yes, of course we have to have rules, but whether we have rules or not, some people will still make the decision to cheat. A rule doesn't ever stop that and I wonder if a little more reliance on the photographers integrity and honesty should not be made in these rules. I am sure the wording could meet everyone's needs and not restrict nature shots unfairly in my view.

## Photoshop Creative Cloud 2015 - Changes

I have done very little panoramic photography myself, but I have a friend here in Australia who has become quite an expert with it. Andy McGaughey captures panoramic landscapes of our local area and beyond and sells them in his shop in Noosa. He reminded me recently of the improvements to be found in Adobe Camera Raw for the panoramic enthusiast. The Panorama can now be created solely in Adobe Camera Raw and the final stitched image is saved as a Raw Dng file.



The result is more control and more flexibility while stitching a number of images together. Open your images into Camera Raw, highlight them all and select Merge to Panorama from the film strip.

Andy is the photographer behind [Top Photos at Gympie Terrace in Noosa](#). He also takes tourists on the Noosa Everglades river tour, but of course when a photographic enthusiast books a tour, they get more than they bargained for.

They can often get expert photographic advice as well as a safe and entertaining river cruise. Check out his web site at the link above and if you bump into him in Noosa, tell him I sent you. The image above is a great panorama and what looks like the sun setting is actually the moon rising.

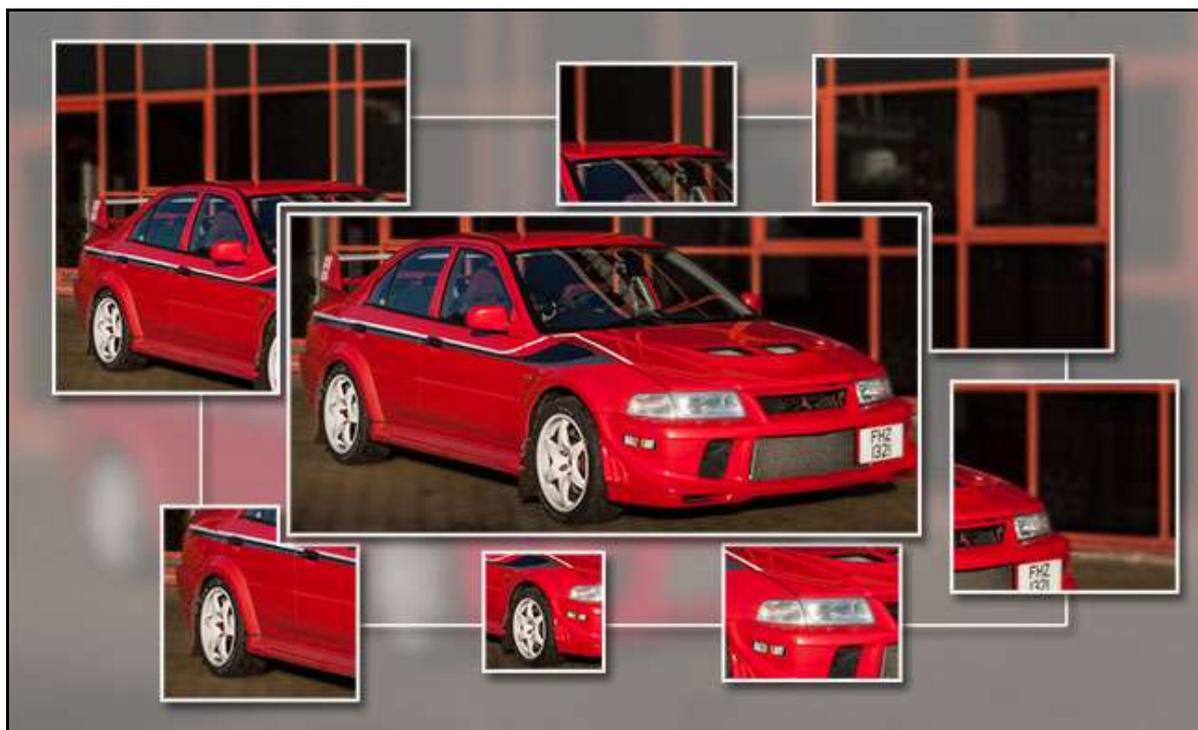

The videos will run in total for over 200 minutes, but for best results as they say. Watch one at a time and allow some time between to practice the ideas yourself. ## **Blind Faith by Barry Beckham**

The image below did quite well in a recent competition and I was asked about it, by a member. It was taken in Lincoln Cathedral last year on our visit back to the UK. This lady was walking around and sitting at various places and I think she may have been a friend of the Church and was making sure people didn't go where they shouldn't.



Human interest often makes a difference in a picture so as casual as I could be (with a camera the size of a small car and a tri-pod) I tried to capture a few shots without her knowledge.

Looking back, I should have just gone up and asked her, but then you often get questioned about what your intentions are? Are you a professional? What are you going to do with the pictures? I have had experience of this and it does make you reluctant to go up and ask.

So, I decided on a clandestine approach, but everytime I casually got into a good spot, she got up and moved on.....mmmmm did she know what I was doing, because it's not always that obvious who is in the shot with wide angle lenses.

At a 30<sup>th</sup> and a 60<sup>th</sup> of a second shutter speed, I had the risk of losing sharpness in her as she walked away, but in the end she was getting away from me so I quickly grabbed a few shots as she walked towards the archway.

I wondered if she thought I was stalking her, which in a way, I was, as every time she sat down in a quiet corner I turned up to casually make out I had no interest in her at all. Might have been easier and quicker to walk up and ask her for a photo, but I never feel comfortable with that these days and I wonder if I am alone with that.

## Photoshop tip – The Hand Tool

If we are drawing on a piece of paper or even doing a little handwriting. Most of us orientate the page to an angle for better comfort. Well, we can do the same thing in Photoshop when we are doing that delicate burning in on edges within an image, or even masking.



Grouped with the standard Hand tool is the Rotate View Tool and the keyboard shortcut is the R key. Once selected you can rotate your image within the Photoshop window to any comfortable angle and then continue editing. Great for delicate work, where the orientation of your image can make a big difference.



We can often be far more controlled and comfortable with a side to side movement of the mouse/pen than we may be with an up and down motion. So, turn your artwork to a more comfortable position. To return to the correct orientation, double click the tool or select reset from the options at the top of the screen

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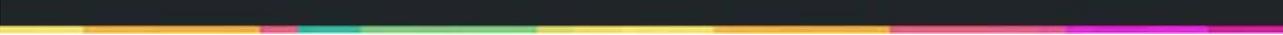
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
